






Message from the Captain of Royal St George's Golf Club

Members of the European Golf Association, England Golf, National Associations, Team Captains, Players, Friends and Officials, it is with great pleasure that I welcome you to Sandwich and to Royal St George's for the 2022 staging of the European Amateur Team Championships. The last time the Club was honoured to host this championship over our links was in 1965, when Ireland prevailed against Scotland. That year individual qualifying rounds were played in gale force westerly winds, with only 28 players posting sub 80 scores in the first round. I hope that this year no player will need a driver, followed by two 2 Irons to reach the 14th green, as was the case 57 years ago!



The Club looks forward to welcoming Europe's best amateur golfers to Royal St George's and we expect to provide you with a course and championship which will allows you to demonstrate your skills at their best. The unique format of the Championship means that every players' score and every match will help determine the final result. HISTORY OF ROYAL ST GEORGE'S GOLF CLUB

Founded in 1887 and intended by its founder, Dr William Laidlaw Purves, to be a rival to St Andrew's in the South of England, St George's is consistently ranked amongst the leading courses in the World.

The Club occupies a unique place in the history of golf, for it was here in 1894, that the Open Championship was first played outside Scotland. In that year, the great J. H. Taylor was the winner but there have been thirteen other winners over the years, most recently Collin Morikawa in 2021.



In all there have been 15 Open Championships played at St George's, more than any course outside of Scotland.

In addition to the Open Championship, the Club has hosted the British P.G.A. Championship on five occasions, the Walker Cup twice, a victorious Curtis Cup in 1988, and has been the venue for the British Amateur Championship on no less than thirteen occasions. Winners at the Club are a veritable Who's Who of golf; Jack Nicklaus won the Grand Challenge as an amateur, Nick Faldo and Seve Ballesteros have both won the P.G.A. Championship here, Darren Clarke, Sandy Lyle, Bill Rogers, Bobby Locke, Reg Whitcombe, Henry Cotton and the great Walter Hagen have all won an Open Championships on the links. Tony Jacklin won the Dunlop Masters at the Club in 1968 when he had the distinction of achieving the first hole in one to be seen live on television. With such a record, it is hardly surprising that the Club is steeped in history and tradition, and even the most casual visitor cannot fail to be aware of this.

The layout of the course has not changed greatly in the last 135 years and provides a stiff but fair test to professional and amateur alike. No two successive holes play in the same direction, making the ability to play shots in all wind conditions a necessity to score well. Members and visitors come from all over the world, to enjoy a world class golf course and the unrivalled standards, ethos and welcome that St George's offers.

PREVIOUS WINNERS



Denmark were crowned the winners of the European Amateur Team Championship in 2021, beating France 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the final.

13 teams contested the Championship at PGA Catalunya in Spain, with the hosts leading the 36-hole stoke play qualifying by 4 strokes with a 17 under par total of 693 but fell to a 6-1 defeat in the Bronze Medal match to Belgium.

Austria, Netherlands, defending Champions Germany and Sweden were the remaining countries making up the 8 teams qualifying for Flight A.
