### **TOURNAMENT HISTORY**

The Jacques Léglise Trophy is an annual amateur boys team competition setting Great Britain and Ireland against the Continent of Europe. Great Britain and Ireland won the tournament in its inaugural years by such a margin that the competition was suspended in 1966. It was reintroduced in 1977 and the continent won the tournament for the first time in the same year. The competition is organised jointly by the R&A and the EGA.

### **SELECTION PROCEDURE**

The Jacques Léglise Trophy Continent of Europe Team Selection Committee comprises Andreas Pallauf (Team Captain), John C. Storjohann (EGA General Secretary) and Richard Heath (EGA Championship Manager). The World Amateur Golf Ranking will be used for selecting five of the nine Jacques Léglise Continent of Europe Trophy players, with the other four coming from Captain's picks.

Updates on player progress will be available from the EGA ranking website and enquires as to prospective players' availability will be made to federations throughout the selection period.

### SYSTEM OF PLAY

The match consists of four foursomes and eight singles of 18 holes on each of the two match days. The foursomes matches are played each morning and the singles in the afternoon. A win counts as one point, a half yields half a point and a lost match returns zero. In the event of a tie, the trophy shall be retained by the holders.
